Your choice of dates, suggested start day: Tuesday

Ukraine is the borderland between Europe and Russia. Explore this resilient region influenced by Polish princes, Cossack hetmen, Turkish khans, Russian communists, and Ukrainian poets and nationalists. The cradle of Slavic civilization, Ukraine offers an abundance of cultural treasures, a richness of detail and a largeness of spirit that can make a devotee out of even the most seasoned traveler. On this compact journey, explore Western Ukraine's Lviv with its European feel before flying to the glittering capital, Kiev, and then on to the historic port city of Odessa.

Daily Itinerary

Day One, Tuesday Arrive Lviv, Ukraine

Following immigration and customs, transfer to the centrally located hotel. Relax for the rest of the afternoon, or explore the neighborhood around your hotel. This evening, meet your guide to discuss the program.

Meals: Independent/en route – *Astoria Hotel or similar*

Day Two, Wednesday Lviv



This morning, begin a full day's exploration of **Lviv**. Lviv is one of the the most beautiful cities in Ukraine, having escaped both the devastation of World War II and the Soviet influences prevalent in Eastern Ukraine. Well-preserved buildings from the 16th to the 19th centuries grace the central square of the **Old Town, added in its entirety to the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1998**. The bulk of Lviv's Old Town architecture, built during the 16th and 17th centuries, is heavily influenced by the Italian Renaissance.

Founded in the 13th century by the prince of Galicia on a hill along the east-west trade routes, Lviv was a much-envied strategic center, especially for its control of the Carpathian passes. Conquered by the Poles in 1349, Lviv seems more European than Russian. The city came under Moscow's rule for the first time in 1939. Occupied by Germany from 1941 to 1944, and again by the Soviets following World War II, Lviv's ethnic heritage was severely repressed.

Begin exploring on **Prospekt Svobody** ("Freedom"), a wide, tree-lined boulevard near **Ploshcha Rynok**, the Market Square. This old, cobbled square, surrounded by 16th-18th century merchant dwellings, was the center of social and economic life for hundreds of years. Key attractions on the



square are the **19th century Town Hall** and the oldest working pharmacy in the country. Founded in 1735 when it was called an apothecary, this shop is fronted with two bas-reliefs – one of Asclepius, the Greek god of medicine, and one of his daughter Hygieia, the Greek goddess of health. Inside is the **Pharmacy Museum**, its walls lined with old shelves stacked with little boxes, antique bottles, vessels, scales and other instruments from years gone by when medicine was more art than science. Opened in 1966, the museum exhibits over 2,000 items relating to the search for potions, herbs and concoctions that might cure humankind's ills.

This afternoon's touring continues with a visit to the **Lychakiv Cemetery**, containing almost 100 acres of monuments, some crowned with sculptures by Ukraine's prominent artists. Some of the country's most renowned citizens, such as poet Ivan Franko, are buried here. For the best view of the city, continue to **High Castle Hill**, home to the 14th century remains of a stone castle that replaced the original 13th century wooden fortress.

After an independent dinner, explore Lviv's walkable Old Town on your own.

Day Three, Thursday

Lviv

After breakfast at the hotel, head out to Lviv's fascinating open-air ethnographic museum. The Shevchenko Hai **Museum of Folk Architecture and Crafts** is a 123-acre forested park outside of Lviv dotted with original wooden buildings from the 18th to the 20th centuries. Grouped into little villages, the houses, churches, barns and mills are furnished with period Ukrainian furniture, clothing, implements and crafts. One of the oldest buildings, the 1763 Church of St. Nikolas, was re-erected here in 1930 and the outdoor museum grew around it.



Next, visit the lavish **Potocki Palace**, built in the 1880s for Alfred Jozef Potocki, the former Minister-President of the Austrian Empire. Much of its original beaux-arts design and architectural details, from the glass chandeliers to the ornamental stucco molding, have been preserved and beautifully restored. Today, the palace is a part of the Lviv National Art Gallery, housing its collection of European art from the 14th to 18th centuries, which includes works by Sofonisba Anguissola, Jan

van Skorel, and Georges de la Tour.

Return to Lviv for an independent dinner. Overnight at the hotel.

Day Four, Friday
Lviv • fly to Kiev

Rise early this morning for your flight to **Kiev**, the mother city of all Eastern Slavic peoples. Kievan Rus', the state from which Ukraine, Russia and Belarus are all descended, was originally established here in the ninth century by Slavicized Scandinavians from Novgorod. Today, this modern capital on the Dnipro River is a city of three million, encompassing countless surviving architectural and artistic treasures.

Touring today begins with the city highlights, including Kiev's oldest Church, St. Sophia Cathedral. The **UNESCO-listed St. Sophia Cathedral and Monastery** houses the historic church-turned-museum,



Sofiysky Sobor. It is the site of the first school and library in Kievan Rus'. The church's location near the Royal Palace and the seat of the metropolitan made St. Sophia the site for royal ceremonies and the signing of treaties. The rich Byzantine interior is decorated with frescoes and mosaics. Its Orthodox symbology initiated a pattern that was followed by Eastern Slavic churches for 900 years.

The gleaming golden cupolas and clear blue color of **Mikhailovsky Cathedral** shine from a bluff overlooking the Dnipro River in Kiev, where the monastery has been since the Middle Ages. Razed by the Soviets in the 1930s, the cherished

cathedral was reconstructed after independence and consecrated in 1999. Legend says that it was in this monastery – originally founded in the 12th century – where Grigori Rasputin first made the acquaintance of the Romanovs. Its full name, Mikhailovsky Zlatoverhy, makes reference to its golden domes.

Continue by exploring beautiful blue **St. Andrews Church** and **Andreevsky Street**, connecting the upper and lower parts of Kiev. The cobbled descent down Andreevsky Street is perhaps Kiev's most charming area. It is a wonderful place to stroll and shop – the main street is filled with galleries, gift shops, restaurants, cafés, and artists' co-ops and studios. Legend says that St. Andrew climbed this hill and planted a cross at the spot where St. Andrew's Church is now. When Kiev adopted Christianity, the new Christians dragged the pagan idol Perun down Andrew's Descent and pushed it into the Dnipro.

After an independent lunch, touring continues with a stop at the **Golden Gates**, the original city gates of Kiev. Finish the day in leafy **Taras Shevchenko Park**, located directly across from the university that now bears his name. The monument to Ukraine's greatest poet that stands in the park replaced one of Czar Nicholas I in 1939, an historic irony because he had persecuted Shevchenko during his lifetime.

After returning to the hotel for check-in this afternoon, the rest of the day is free to explore Kiev's broad boulevards and medieval streets. Dinner tonight is independent, with overnight at the hotel.

Day Five, Saturday

Kiev

After breakfast at the hotel, drive to **Mezhyhira**, the former mansion compound of **ousted President Viktor Yanukovych**, complete with a full-size galleon floating on a man-made lake, a classic car collection, private zoo and golden bathroom fixtures. Many of those living in a country with a per capita income of approximately \$7,300 take a dim view of these excesses.

After a tour of the compound and an independent lunch back in Kiev, continue on to the **Podil District**, the historic mercantile and trading quarter of Kiev, with its original buildings from the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries. Near the harbor is the single-domed **St. Elias Church**, said to have been built on the site of Kiev's first wooden church. The first higher education institution in Ukraine, the **Kiev-Mohyla Academy** was established in 1615. A hotbed of Ukrainian nationalism, it was closed by the czars and only reopened in 1992, following the independence of Ukraine. Today, it is a modern university, with online scientific libraries and international language programs.

Next, pay a visit to the **Chernobyl Museum**. The Chernobyl Museum illustrates the combination of human error and design flaws responsible for the 1986 explosion and fire at Reactor #4, only 62 miles from Kiev. The reactor, put into commission only three years before, exploded and burned during a shutdown, blowing tons of radioactive material into the atmosphere. This small, compelling museum offers a modern re-creation of the events of that day, and shows the path of the radiation and the mass evacuations that eventually relocated over 300,000 people from Ukraine and Belarus. The nuclear accident and its subsequent cover-up marked the beginning of the dissolution of the Soviet Union.

Following the museum, take a ride back to the hotel on the **Kiev Metro**. A metro system for Kiev was first suggested by a Russian-American trading company in 1916. Following the Bolshevik Revolution, Kiev's status was reduced to a secondary city and therefore the metro project was set aside. In 1934, Kiev became the capital city of the Ukrainian SSR, and two years later, funds were allocated for the construction of Kiev's metro system. However, World War II caused the project to be further delayed. During the war, much of Kiev was destroyed, and the reconstruction plan included funds to build the system.

In 1960, the first metro line opened, running from the Vokzalna to the Dnipro. The early stations are decorated with colorful mosaics, ornaments and bas-reliefs, while the floor plans demonstrate the functionality and restraint of Khrushchev-era buildings. Today, the system has over 50 stops, transports an estimated 1.38 million people per day, and is celebrated for having **one of the deepest stations in the world, Arsenalna**, which requires more than a six-minute escalator ride.

On the way back to the hotel, walk through Kiev's **Khreshchatyk Street**. This is Kiev's main street, lined with neoclassical public buildings, cafés and lots of upscale shopping. On weekends and holidays, Khreshchatyk becomes a pedestrian thoroughfare, dedicated to shopping, strolling, people-watching and street performers. Kiev's central square on Khreshchatyk Street is filled with fountains and glass domes. Known as the Maidan, its full name has been Maidan Nezalezhnosti, or **Independence Square**, since independence in 1991. This is where the populace camped and demonstrated during the Orange Revolution and again in February of 2014, when President Viktor Yanukovych was deposed.

Dinner is independent tonight, with overnight at the hotel.

Day Six, Sunday
Kiev • fly to Odessa

After breakfast at the hotel this morning, start with a visit to the **UNESCO World Heritage Site of Pecherskaya Lavra**, or the Caves Monastery, Kievan Rus' first monastery which was founded in 1051. The monks dug caves and underground labyrinths, living and studying in them; their mummified bodies still line the walls. Here the historian-monk Nestor compiled much of the earliest known history of the Slavs, "*The Tale of Bygone Days*," and passed on the crafts of icon-painting and building. The **Dormition (or Ascension) Cathedral** was built from 1073 to 1089 on the monastery grounds. Kiev's second great Byzantine church, the Dormition Cathedral was the model for the early 12th century churches of Russia's Golden Ring towns.

After an independent lunch, head to the **War Memorial and Army Museum**. Overlooking the Dnipro near the Caves Monastery is the 330-foot stainless steel statue, Rodina Mat' ("Mother of the Nation"), holding aloft a sword and shield. The 35-acre park where she can be found is part of a memorial to those who fought in the Second World War, or the "Great Patriotic War," as it is called in the former Soviet republics.



Dinner today will be independent. Transfer to the Kiev airport for your evening flight to Odessa. Upon arrival, transfer to the hotel for overnight.

Day Seven, Monday
Odessa

Begin your exploration of this sunny port city with a **walking tour of Odessa**. After southern Ukraine and its coveted Black Sea coast was ceded to Russia by the Ottoman Turks in 1792, Catherine the Great founded a naval base and strategic fort here, naming it Odessa after an ancient Greek city believed to be in the area. Odessa quickly grew into a thriving

merchant port, shipping the abundant Ukrainian grain around the world.

Always considered a cultural center, Odessa has produced some of the world's finest classical performers, and may be best known for its **Potemkin Steps**, immortalized in Sergei Eisenstein's film *Battleship Potemkin*. Built in 1837 as a monument to the Duke de Richelieu, they are the best place to view Odessa's busy harbor and waterfront.

Admire the exterior of the **Odessa Opera and Ballet Theater**; with its warm Black Sea backdrop, it is a recognizable symbol of the city. Designed by Austrian architects in 1887, its baroque style and Renaissance features make it one of the most beautiful theaters in Europe today. The small **Vorontsov**



Palace at one end of Primorsky Boulevard was built in 1826 in the neoclassical style, and once housed the governor of Odessa. In 1917, the city's first Workers' Collective, or *soviet*, met here.

You'll pass the **Mother of God's Assumption Cathedral**, which was built in three stages. Lviv's Armenian merchants paid for construction of the sanctuary in 1363, modeling it after an ancient Armenian church in Ani and covering the walls with frescoes. Additions were built in the 17th and the 20th centuries.

After an independent lunch, continue to the edge of town for a tour of the **Odessa Partisan Catacombs**. The catacombs were formed as quarrymen with horses cut and dragged blocks of limestone from beneath the city to build most of Odessa's palaces and government buildings. The tunnels, possibly 500 miles of them, can be found everywhere under the city and its suburbs. Odessa's upper class citizens found that the temperature and humidity of the tunnels were perfect for storing wine, and its smugglers discovered they were perfect for storing and moving contraband. The most well-known of their uses, however, was during World War II, when Axis forces overran the city and the Ukrainian partisans took their resistance movement literally underground.

Return to the centrally located hotel this afternoon and enjoy your last evening in Ukraine. Dinner tonight is independent.

Day Eight, Tuesday
Depart Odessa

Following breakfast at the hotel, the trip ends with a transfer to the airport.

While the accommodations we utilize are superior tourist class, please keep in mind that some aspects of the tourism infrastructure in Ukraine are not up to the standards North American travelers expect. Services are improving in the region; nevertheless, you may encounter problems with plumbing, bureaucratic service, road conditions, unpaved sidewalks, uneven surfaces and steps, and availability and quality of public restrooms. You are traveling in some areas which, relatively speaking, have seen few travelers, and the infrastructure is not yet fully developed.

While this program is designed to be the most comfortable possible for travel in this region, it is rated as **rigorous touring** because of the daily walking involved, and the overall shortcomings of the tourism infrastructure. This itinerary features a significant amount of touring on foot. Many streets are of cobblestone, and some attractions are only accessible via steep staircases; museums rarely have elevators.

Every effort has been made to make the information in this schedule accurate. However, trip itineraries are always subject to change. We will do our best to inform you in advance of any changes, but due to the nature of travel in Ukraine this may not always be possible. Only those willing to accept these conditions should consider joining this program.

To reap the full rewards of this adventure, travelers must be able to walk at least a mile a day. Flexibility, a sense of humor and a willingness to accept local standards of amenities and services are essential components to the enjoyment of your trip.

Weather

Ukraine enjoys a continental climate with warm summers and fairly mild winters. Depending on individual preferences, the best times to visit fall between May and September. May temperatures usually see a low around 50 degrees Fahrenheit and highs in the mid-60s to 70s. August heats up, with highs around 80 degrees Fahrenheit and up, while the averages in early fall drop back to the 60s. In general, in the early spring and in the fall, evenings cool down substantially and can be in the mid-30 to 40 degree range. Rain is also possible.

Please remember, weather at all times of year has an element of the unpredictable. This information comes from www.weatherbase.com and is based on data from previous temperatures on



record. It is always advisable to check with www.weatherbase.com closer to your departure date for current conditions and forecasts for the specific region you will be visiting.
